ome of you may recall the January news report about a shooting in Brightridge that took the life of a 12-year-old girl and seriously injured her mother when 42 bullets were fired into their home. The child's surviving sister, Rayneisa, was in the home during the incident but not physically injured. Rayneisa, currently in school, is working to finish her studies and become a medical assistant by the end of October. Because of the shooting incident, which actually has nothing to do with her, Rayneisa is now ineligible for her HUD-supported housing, and is in a financial situation that may preclude her from finishing her education.

Community House is standing in solidarity with other Northside churches to raise funds to help Rayneisa pay her \$400a-month rent until October. Allowing Rayneisa to stay settled in her home and to complete her studies will help her build a better life for both herself and her young son.

The community gathered at Community House for Easter service was given the opportunity to contribute toward Raynesia's future. Community House family and friends raised a generous \$332. Thank you to all who helped this one individual - this really does make a difference!

On the minds and hearts of our members -- Congregation member's project receives grant

✓ laudia Detwiler and her colleague from the American Friend's Service Committee were recently notified that they were awarded a \$4,000 grant to work with area congregations to provide anti-torture education and witness.

The National Religious Coalition Against Torture (NRCAT) awarded the grant in response to their proposal for outreach to churches, synagogues, mosques, and other religious institutions to do outreach and to put on a conference about torture.

The proposal was based on the contention held by Claudia and her colleague that, "We live in a country whose news media and politicians are complicit by their consistent use of euphemisms when referring to these physically and mentally excruciating and sometimes fatal practices. In order to open up the moral discussion that our country desperately needs, it is up to the rest of us to learn how to talk about torture and how to engage others in the discussion, until there is a groundswell of opinion that demands changes from our country."

The all-day conference, "Talking About Torture: How Can We Learn to Speak About the Unspeakable?" is planned for September 20. It will consist of a panel of speakers, small group workshops, a dramatic presentation, a visible witness, and a future-action component. The outreach component will span the spring and summer with a variety of area congregations.

From Discussion to Action

Race, Discrimination and Pittsburgh -- Moving Beyond 'Groundhog Day'

Wednesday, April 30, 2008 6:00 PM, light meal 7:00 PM, Community Conversation

As the finale to the Community House Race Series, Community House member Dr. Herman Jones will encourage all those present to define and pledge to take concrete steps to break the "Groundhog Day" effect of our deliberations on race. Plans for the session were prompted by the belief that while discussions, reports, protests, workshops, marches, legislation and movements about racial justice in America have been going on for centuries, it remains a seriously unresolved issue. Herman will ask us to determine, as a community of sensitive and aware individuals, what can we offer to each other -- in terms of specific, concrete action steps -- that will move us beyond a 'Groundhog Day-like' discussion of race and towards a more just and equitable community.

A Fresh Perspective on Homosexuality and Christianity

For the Bible Tells Me So will be screened on Wednesday, April 23 at 7:00 p.m. at CHPC. The documentary explores such questions as: Can love between two people ever be an abomination? Is the Bible an excuse to hate? Is the chasm separating gays and lesbians and Christianity too wide to cross? For the Bible Tells Me So offer healing, clarity and understanding to anyone caught in the crosshairs of scripture and sexual identity.

Through the experiences of five very normal, very Christian, very American families -- including those of former House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt and Episcopal Bishop Gene Robinson -- we discover how insightful people of faith handle the realization of having a gay child. Informed by such respected voices as Bishop Desmond Tutu, Harvard's Peter Gomes, Orthodox Rabbi Steve Greenberg and Reverend Jimmy Creech, *For the Bible Tells Me So* offers healing, clarity and understanding to anyone caught in the crosshairs of scripture and sexual identity.

Cream Scones

Ingredients: 2 cups flour 1/4 cup sugar (add'l to sprinkle on top) 1T baking powder 1 1/2 t salt 3/4 dried fruit (apricots, apples, raisins, peaches, mango, etc.) 1 1/4 cup cream (I use 1 cup cream, 1/4 cup milk) Topping: 2T butter, melted Sugar

Combine powdered dry ingredients. Add fruit. Add cream. Stir to moisten. Dump onto floured surface and knead 10 times. Pat out into a 12" circle. Brush with melted butter, Sprinkle with sugar. Use pizza cutter to cut into 12 wedges. Place on cookie sheet

Bake at 425 degrees for 15 minutes or until lightly golden. Cool before bagging. Store in cool, dry place.

Before that gathering, Lutherans Concerned/North America, More Light Presbyterians sister organization, proposed to their supporters the knitting of lovely rainbow scarves to mark their hopes and prayers for that assembly. Now it is our opportunity to combine the truth of GLBT inclusion and the beauty of handcrafted creativity into an unmistakable visual sign of God's all embracing love. The GLBT supporters were clearly marked at the Lutheran Assembly let's be marked too at our General Assembly!

Challenge from Janet to Knitters/Knitting Groups across our land:

This is a social justice project, knitting us all together, compassionately, with our GLBT sisters and brothers who suffer so from the rejection of gifts for service to the church, judgment of loving relationships and silencing of voices among us. More Light Presbyterians challenges you to create as many rainbow scarves as you can, according to the directions below, between now and June 9, 2008. Experts and beginners, like me, can pray and knit our way to San Jose, establishing a solid fabric of spiritual support for the efforts at our General Assembly for full inclusion of GLBT faithful.

Yarn: Red Heart Supersaver Multicolor; the color is Mexicana (0950).

The yarn is online at the following website, <u>www.coatscollection.com</u>. If you type in the search engine on the page DB010527 (both are zeros, hope they don't look like Os) it takes you to the type of yarn and then you can find Mexicana (color 0950). If the site won't let you see all the pages of yarn, you can select on the page, see all (as opposed to 12 yarns per page) and Mexicana is listed. Also online on Joanne's Fabrics and available at their stores and Michael's. Please use only this yarn, as this, along with Jesus' love, is the thread running between us all!

Knitting Instructions:

The scarves can be any size between 3 to 6 inches across and 48 to 68 inches long, using needles between sizes 8 and 11. Remember as you choose your stitch that these will be used in summer in San Jose, mostly inside the air conditioned conference center.

Comments from Tammy Besser, one of the veteran Lutheran knitters: For straight knit on size 10 and 11 needles I'm casting on 10-14 stitches. Everyone is welcome to use whatever stitches, patterns, etc. you wish for these...it is a great project for trying out something new! My favorite to date is made with seed stitch, cast on 13 stitches on 10.5 needles alternate stitches (knit, purl) beginning with Knit on each row.

Crochet Instructions

− Η hook (can use larger or smaller depending on size of stitch desired) − Triple Crochet (TC) in 5th ch from hook and in ea ch across − Ch 4, turn, TC in ea st across; at the end of the row work last TC in top of turning ch* −

*repeat until desired width is reached

Make as many chains as you think will create a stole between 40 and 60 inches in length. Width can be anywhere between 3 and 6 inches.
